Push Factors

bad conditions that push people away from their home (reasons)

Push/Pull Factors



Push Factors and Pull Factors are reasons why someone would decide to move. A Push Factor is a reason someone would leave their residence, while a Pull Factor is a reason someone might move to a new location.

Immigration - Push/Pull Factors

Immigration refers to someone moving permanently to a new country. Push and pull factors influence a person's decision to move. A push factor is a reason someone might be 'pushed' away from a country. Common push factors include: war, unemployment rate (lack of jobs available), crime rate, school systems, etc. A pull factor is a reason someone might move to a certain place. Common pull factors an area might showcase are: low crime, healthcare, desirable climate, strong economy, family living there, job opportunities, and strong educational programs.

British Columbia Pull Factors

Immigration in B.C. happened rapidly in the late 1800's to the early 1900's. Over 500,000 people immigrated to B.C. within that time period. Many factors influenced the heavy immigration. First, the lack of available arable land in the USA led to many Americans moving north to Canada. In Europe, it was more of the same, as land was hard to obtain and much more costly. In B.C. and the Prairies, land was cheap and fertile. Secondly, B.C. had two major gold rushes that brought waves of people to the Fraser River and the Cariboo Mountains. The opportunity to find gold and become rich was a major pull factor for immigrants, especially Chinese immigrants! Thirdly, religious freedom was another strong pull factor, as Canadians were not forced to practice a certain religion like it was in many other European countries.

Push Factors Around the World

World War I was a major push factor in Europe. Many people worried for their safety and fled to Canada. Overcrowding in Europe was another reason for people to make the move to Canada. Many wanted land to farm on, but it wasn't available to them. Religious discrimination also sent people to Canada because they were persecuted for practicing certain religions in Europe.


